Before Your Visit

Prepare students for your visit with one or more of these activities.

- Look at early photographs and discuss what life would have been like in France or the U.S. in 1850. What were the latest breakthroughs in technology. How do they compare to innovations today?
- Go outside with colored pencils or watercolors. See what you can capture of a place in a short amount of time. Discuss which elements were helpful to include to capture particular aspects of the scene.
- Create a collaborative timeline of important events in France and the world between 1850 and 1950. Consider the impact these events would have had on: artists, world leaders, everyday people.
